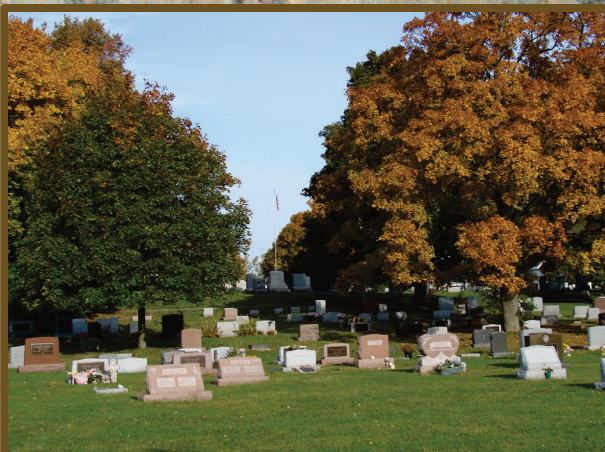




Maplewood Cemetery

Rich, poor, famous and unknown are buried here. Among the best known are Joseph and Abby Brown who are the parents of Antoinette Brown Blackwell. Others are James H. Sperry, Henry V. Burger, Emma E. Sherman and Floyd Stone Winslow, MD for whom four Rush-Henrietta schools have been named.

Through the generations, familiar family names continue to reappear in the ledgers and headstones as well as in the minutes, officers list and Board Members of the Maplewood Cemetery.

Countless other town members contributed to the growth of the cemetery and continue to play a significant role in its development.

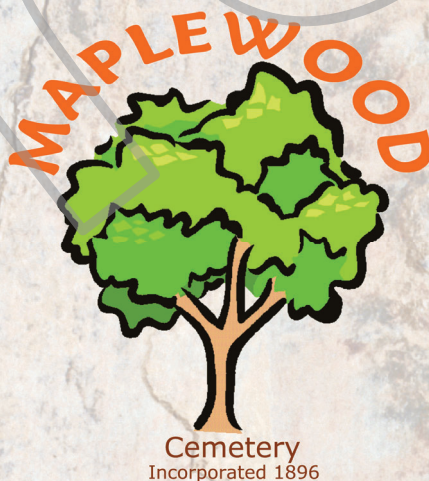

Incorporated 1896



The Maplewood Cemetery,

a landmark within a town rich in history, has its own heritage. The town burial site was originally privately owned by T.O. Jones and had been used as a town cemetery. It was incorporated in 1896. Since the incorporation, approximately 15 acres have been added to the original 5, making a total of 23.5 acres.

Herein lie the epic tales which intertwine the past, present and future of the town of Henrietta. Early grave sites date back to the mid-nineteenth century and lie in the oldest section of the cemetery. Maplewood Cemetery has been expanded over the years to meet the needs of a growing population. However, the traditions which were established upon inception have been upheld. Maplewood Cemetery continues to allow families to use upright monuments and takes pride in the maintenance of the grounds. The surroundings are peaceful, park-like and welcoming. There is a pastoral environment intended to encourage visitation and individual enhancement.

A Plot Rich In Heritage



In 1936 the Dikeman Family donated the remains of their plot to the American Legion Post and a flag pole was donated and erected. The Ely Fagan Legion Post hosts a Veterans Memorial Day service at the cemetery every year.

U.S. Flags are placed on the graves of veterans; three of which were in the American Revolutionary War, two from the War of 1812, two from the Mexican War, twenty-four from the Civil War. Over 425 graves were decorated for Memorial Day in 2010.

A Memorial Garden

was established in grateful recognition of those who have served the Maplewood Cemetery Association as President, Secretary, Superintendent and Board Members. In 1991 a bequest was given in the name of Floyd Goodberlet, who served as Superintendent for 24 years. At that time the Board elected to establish a legacy to Mr. Goodberlet and those who have been involved with the cemetery. The garden is a beautiful, peaceful spot which invites reflection over the memories of a lifetime and the building of a community.
